
TRIBUTE TO CYRIL MOORE

Cyril was born in Tobago and later moved to Trinidad to live with his close relative, Eva Jack Joseph, who played a vital part in his success. He was an assistant minister of the North Trinidad Methodist circuit in Trinidad and Tobago.



Cyril was one of the few master tailors in Trinidad and Tobago and brought those skills with him to Canada. He arrived in Vancouver in 1968 and moved to Kelowna in 1969. He worked at the Bay as well as had his own tailoring company 'Cyril Moore Tailoring'.

Cyril was a great 'family-man' - he loved his wife Amy, his sons Kevin and Bruce and his grandchildren.

Cyril was active with the Kiwanis Club, the Cricket Club, Fat Cat Festival. Caribbean Festival and his church. Cyril served as the co-president ISCO (Intercultural Society of the Central Okanagan) which later merged

to form Global Citizen Events.

Every Taste of Home, Cyril greeted attendees at the door playing his drum and wearing a smile. Cyril was one of the original performers at the first Kelowna Folkfest in 1974 and remained involved ever since. He has been a Committee member and served as Vice Chair for many years.
